With Jim's retirement, Rev. Kirk Hatcher begins his responsibilities as Minister of Spiritual Formation. With Kirk's transition, we will welcome Rev. Rich Lubbers and his wife, Stacy, to our ministry team on January 11. Rich accepted the call to serve as Minister to Youth on December 14. I am thankful for the work of our Youth Ministry Search Team in leading us to Rich and the prayerful consideration of our congregation in calling him. May God bless both Kirk and Rich as they transition and minister among us in new ways.

Continue to pray for our Minister of Worship Arts/Music Search team. They are working hard to discern who God is calling to lead our Worship Arts/Music ministry. Over the last weeks they have been contacting potential candidates for more information and initiating exploratory conversations. While making progress, the search team is still uncertain as to the length of the search process. With this in mind, the ministry staff, with the support of the Deacon Leadership Team, would like to continue to wait to transition our worship services and times until the new Minister of Worship Arts/Music joins us. Until then, we will enjoy the interim leadership of Don Gilmore and Chris Canary for our two worship services.

On January 11, I will bring the Annual Sermon during a combined worship service. We will reflect on 2014 and turn

our hearts and thoughts to the coming year. These are important days for our church and I will share the challenges and opportunities that lie before us as we seek to fulfill our mission to Love People, Teach the Word, and Live the Journey as Christ-followers. We must commit to strive for unity across the generations and allow our diversity to be our greatest strength. This is an important day for our church and I hope that you will be in attendance. Our Classic and LifeSong services will resume on January 18.

Jim Stewart reflects on 30 years at First Baptist before retirement

When Jim Stewart was about 12 or 13, his grandmother told him he was going to be a minister.

"I just laughed," Stewart said. "Over 40 years later, here I am."

Stewart's ministry will come to a close at First Baptist Church on December 31 when he retires as Associate Pastor of Education and Family Life.

"I never imagined in 1985 that I would still be here in 2015," Stewart said.

Stewart admits the decision to retire wasn't an easy one, but he feels that God has called him in another direction. Stewart's retirement plans include staying in Norman and offering his clergy skills on a part-time basis to churches who are without a minister. Stewart also plans to minister at an area children's home.

"I'm looking forward to the next chapter of my life. I have been behind the stained glass windows of the church and it's time for me to go outside and to the rest of the world. I don't have any grandiose ideas of traveling around the world. My vision of that is going back to a faith-based children's home to work with families and children and single parents trying to rebuild their lives, pouring a little bit of myself into them," Stewart said.

On January 4, Stewart will preach in a special combined worship service that will feature the Lord's Supper and a very special baptism.

"As a minister, I have gotten to baptize all three of my children. And, God willing, on January 4, I'll get to baptize my granddaughter," Stewart said.

There is something sobering, Stewart said, as he moves closer to his retirement.

"You think 'Have I done all that I've wanted to do?' And I think the answer will always be no. I don't

ever want to be accused of doing everything I set out to do. I'm not sure that's healthy," Stewart said. "I think there will always be a point where your dreams exceed your grasp. There is always something else out there."

Stewart believes that his time at First Baptist has allowed groundwork to be laid for future members of the congregation.

"I like the model that I'm planting trees the shade of which I'll never enjoy. That's kind of the way I've approached my ministry," Stewart said.

Stewart said that retirement has a surreal feeling.

"Just to think that you have been here long enough to have had kids in summer camps and sports programs at the Family Life Center, and then you have been here long enough to have their children (in camps)," Stewart said. "Some of those kids that I had that were in the summer camps when I was at the FLC then worked in our camps. Then they went away to school somewhere and then they got married and a few of them have come back and asked me to do their wedding. That's pretty gratifying."

Stewart admits that his career wouldn't be possible without the

support of his wife Vicki.

"I raised my stock considerably when I got married. She always said she wanted to marry a minister. She had no idea that would mean she would have to give up aspirations of being on one of the top 10 financial wizards list. But she didn't care," Stewart said.

The relationships he's built over the years at First Baptist will be what Stewart misses most when he retires.

"Probably the biggest part of a minister's job is empowering other people to use what gifts they have and to serve in whatever capacity God is calling them in. It has been very gratifying to see people over the years step up to the plate and say, 'I can do that.' Not everybody says yes, but for those that do, I think they are the ones who really end up being the winner in that deal because they see a part of themselves that they didn't see," Stewart said.

The best days in the history of First Baptist are yet to come, Stewart adds.

"God is still going to do some things here. I'm going to try to support the staff and the church the best I can," Stewart said.

A reception honoring Stewart will be held at First Baptist in Hallock Hall on January 4.

Thank you, Guido of Arezzo for giving us the beauty of music

Guido of Arezzo (Italy) was a Benedictine monk and music teacher in the 10th century. His early career was spent at the monastery of Pomposa where he quickly became aware of the difficulty that singers experienced remembering the choruses — called Gregorian chants — that were used in their worship services.

He thought that there had to be a better way to learn and participate in music singing and playing since learning by rote was such an inefficient and ponderous way to learn. He went out on a limb, thinking, "I'm going to move music reading into the 11th century and find a better way to save and share the music." He created the precursor of our modern musical notation notes, words, rhythms, on a group of parallel lines that we call a musical staff.

The availability of notated music enables singers and players to literally be on the same page. We can instantly share in the God-given

gift of creativity — the excitement of making music together — and be much more efficient about our work. Printed music allows quick participation rather than just having to listen along.

In Norman, in the 21st century, we are so very fortunate that the learning

and performing of music of all sorts is still honored in schools and churches. Parents, keep encouraging your kids in their choir participation at school and at church and they'll continue to learn — not only how to read, but also how to use the music that we read to worship God together.

One member of our Sanctuary Choir told me recently that he doesn't "read" music, but he can tell by looking when the notes go up and down. Well, that's a pretty good start. If you worship in our Classic service and can tell when things go up and down, you are fully qualified to join our choir for the new year. Our new Minister of Worship Arts/ Music will be pleased to have you



on board.

Speaking for the choir, our worship leadership on Sundays is our sacrifice of praise. We sing to God, first and foremost and always. Soli Deo Gloria! — to the glory of God alone.


I ask that you continue to pray




