What is the best way to live life on the planet? This question was posed by Dr. Thom Wolf at a recent pastors' conference.

He explained that this is the question of the 21st century. Think of the many layers involved in the answer. People of different cultures and religions once separated by borders and distance are now neighbors. Technology that connects us with the world in ways previously unimagined, creating security risks on numerous levels. Prosperity enjoyed by more and more people, yet more and more finding themselves destitute. Medical advances extending the life expectancy of most on the planet, yet viruses like Ebola with potential to kill masses of people. Knowledge increasing daily, injustices as well.

The layers continue to unfold and the world continues to change, but the question remains: How shall we live? More specifically, how shall those who profess the lordship of Jesus Christ live in this broken world? How should we treat each other? How should we treat our enemies? How should we use our time and resources? How should we live with neighbors and in communities that no longer share our foundational convictions and views of life and God? The more layers we peel back, the more frustrated and confused we grow. Secularists tell us that the scriptures are irrelevant and speak to a forgotten time. On the contrary, the teachings of the prophets and of Jesus may be more relevant and useful than ever.

Micah (6:8) outlined more than 2,500 years ago a new and radical way to live: Do Justice, Love Kindness, and Walk Humbly with God. The life of Jesus reaffirms and models this teaching. It is not an easy way of life, nor is it free from its struggles and tensions.

Join us in worship over the first three

Sundays of February as we explore these questions and seek the best way to live on the planet.

Easter is April 5, which means our Ash Wednesday service is February 18. Our Lenten worship series, *Glimpses*, begins on February 22. The Old Testament foreshadows many Easter themes. *Glimpses* will consider some of those Old Testament passages before moving into the Gospel of Matthew where we will make our way to the cross and empty tomb of Jesus. Make plans to join us for these special Lenten worship services. The Norman Ministerial Fellowship's annual Lenten services begin on Wednesday, February 25 at Alameda Church of Christ. May God be glorified and may we be transformed through our worship together.

Continue to be in prayer for our Minister of Worship Arts/Music search team. They are diligently praying, working and believing that God is leading them to whom He is preparing to minister among us.

Thank you for your response and feedback to this year's Annual Sermon. *A Comm-Unity of Love* describes the journey that we are on to be a generational family that worships, serves and shares life together. Jesus clearly states that the world will know that we are His disciples by the way we love each other. Our neighbors are watching as we talk and move through the challenges of our journey. What are they seeing? Let's focus on being a *Comm-Unity of Love* and be amazed at how God creates more opportunities for us to love and teach others.

As part of the Annual Sermon, I shared how we finished the year financially. In December we received

just over \$300,000 in offerings to our ministry plan/budget (ahead of last year's giving), more than \$100,000 in Ignite contributions, and finished the year with more than \$60,000 toward our \$50,000 goal in world missions offerings. Thank you for your generosity and faithfulness in giving. These are significant gifts

that reflect God's work among us. Let us rejoice!

Many of our members have discovered the joy and blessing of giving their tithes and offerings to the church. Tithing is an important step of faith. It is a biblical and a spiritual practice which requires discipline and focus. Tithing is one of the tools that God provides to combat the materialism and consumerism of our world. It is a reminder that God provides the harvest and that everything we have is His. I invite you to commit to the journey today. Ask someone to share their commitment to and practice of tithing. It will enhance your life and deepen your walk with the Lord.

I believe that God is doing new things in our midst. Over the last weeks, God has added new individuals and families to our church. Others are renewing their fellowship with us. Still others are visiting and seeking God's direction. I recently visited with two men who have given their lives to the Lord and are seeking baptism as a result of the ministries of our church. The sparks of renewal are all around. Let us humble ourselves, be faithful, and by God's grace experience the holy fire of His love and fellowship.

To most, she is simply known as Miss Carol

Almost like a rock star, Carol McDade-Conley can be found most weekdays on the gymnasium floor of the Family Life Center surrounded by children, all eager to give her a hug after their gymnastics class.

At the end of 2014, McDade-Conley celebrated 31 years as director of the gymnastics program at First Baptist Church.

"People ask me, 'Are you ever going to quit?' and I say, 'Well, when God quits providing me with children and wonderful instructors, then it's time.' And when I quit enjoying it. I don't ever dread getting up and coming to work. But I still have wonderful kids and wonderful instructors," McDade-Conley said.

Her favorite part of her job is, obviously, the kids and getting to know all the families.

"I'm on my second generation of kids so that makes me very happy. I have wonderful instructors and most of my instructors have been students of mine. Some of my instructors I have right now started with me when they were 3 years old," McDade-Conley said.

McDade-Conley loves to teach and her gymnastics background goes back to when she was a cheerleader at Norman High and the University of Oklahoma.

"One summer, I took a bunch of kids to a camp and learned (gymnastics) right along with them. I just jumped in there and learned," McDade-Conley said.

It was under the advisement of Doug Cheeves that McDade-Conley began teaching gymnastics at First Baptist.

"Doug Cheeves, the original minister of recreation, he asked me if I wanted to do something at the Family Life Center. This was way before it was built. I said, 'I don't know, I'm really busy,'" McDade-Conley said.

Eventually, McDade-Conley found time in her schedule and the program began with 70 kids.

"We have about 300 now," McDade-Conley said. "We really teach the kids. We do bars, beams, tumbling and balls. We do everything. We are one-on-one. We keep our groups small."

The children that enroll in

McDade-Conley's gymnastics classes are there to basically learn balance and coordination.

"A lot of people ask me if kids have changed over the years, they really haven't. Especially the little ones. If you tell them something to do and you reinforce it, they are going to do it," McDade-Conley said. "Every morning before I come here or wherever I'm going to teach gymnastics, I just ask the good Lord to keep the kids safe and for me to make a difference in their lives today. And I get it all paid back because they just hug."

Through her teachings, McDade-Conley says that her life is enriched by the many children she has known in the last 31 years.

"I have kids that I see grow up, I've got my friend's kids, my friend's grandkids in gymnastics. I'm just a part of so many lives. It's just made me a better person. I'm just the luckiest person in the world because I have all these kids, and I remember every kid I've had," McDade-Conley said.

Thanks for the notes

Our Worship and Music Ministry benefits from the generosity of our people. Our people benefit from creative expressions by those in our worship and music ministry. Tithes and offerings are transformed from dollars and cents into notes and lyrics that we use to reach toward God during worship and special events.

As we discussed last month, the most efficient way to learn music for worship is to acquire copies of music, pass them out, and rehearse them. In a matter of moments, our choir and orchestra can be playing and singing the correct notes, rhythms and words, and doing so in the right place. After agreeing on details like volume, style, phrasing and diction (this is rehearsing), the music is unified and ready. New music is purchased after careful review and analysis, always considering appropriateness and accessibility. We readily borrow music from other churches, and freely share with other churches. Appropriate music also is purchased for the children's choirs, and the LifeSong Band.

We use funds for supplies and music for Special Programs

presented by the Music Ministry. These church-wide events include the Christmas Music Program, the Patriotic Celebration, the Palm Sunday and Easter programs like the Tennebrae service during Holy Week, and the 125th Anniversary Choir and Orchestra Concert this past October.

Our music organizations are led and assisted by skilled musicians who are compensated from budget funds. Salaries are paid to the Minister of Music/Worship Arts, the LifeSong Worship Leader, the Sanctuary Orchestra director, the Organist, the Pianist, and the Music Ministry assistant. Dollars from special funds including those raised by choir and orchestra members compensate Choral and Instrumental scholars – OU students who supplement our choir and orchestra. We hire additional musicians as needed for special events.

Thanks to our church family for enabling us to make the music that enhances our worship experiences while providing a place of service for those who choose to offer their talents back to God.
