Are you aware of the significant things going on in missions through the life of First Baptist?

Yes, we are all on mission and called to serve on mission in our neighborhoods and communities, but in this moment, I am thinking about missions in the historic sense — living or serving incarnationally in a foreign land or culture.

Many of you are aware that we have at least four missionary families serving with the International Mission Board that have ties to our church. Our missionary house allows us to offer the gift of rest and hospitality for career missionaries coming home on furlough. These relationships have fostered opportunities for FBC groups to serve in Thailand, Turkey, and North Africa. Over the next months, members of our church will serve on short term mission projects in Uganda, Peru, Cuba, and here in Oklahoma.

Seven students/young adults are committing their summers to serving in Asia, Europe, and Peru. At least two other students will spend the summer in Kansas City ministering through OU's Baptist Collegiate Ministries. We have students committing their summer to work at children/youth camps in Texas, Arkansas, and here in Norman. And, because of your faithful giving, we are able to support one of our former youth and her husband as they look to begin ministry with Greater Europe Mission in Manchester, England. In addition, three current/former FBC students will enroll at Truett seminary in the fall to prepare for vocational ministry. The Spirit of God continues to call the generations of First Baptist to go, to serve, and to tell the good news of Jesus Christ to the nations. How is God calling you to serve and support this movement of His Spirit?

On Friday and Saturday, May

29-30, the sanctuary will be open for Pray First. During this 20 hour focus, we are inviting our church family to a guided prayer journey that

should take about an hour. It will be a time to listen, to intercede and to share about God's work among and through us.

With the calling of a Minister of Worship Arts/Music, the worship transition that we have been anticipating is upon us. Chad Smith's first day in the office will be June 8. He will lead in the Classic service on June 14 and June 28 and in the LifeSong service on June 21 before leading our July 5 combined worship service. These initial weeks will give Chad the opportunity to get to know us, our worship teams and to help us transition from simultaneous to early/late worship services.

Our current plan is to transition worship and Sunday School times on July 12. This mid-July date should allow us time to work through the details as we anticipate the return of students and new families for the start of the school year in August.

Don Gilmore completes his third interim at FBC in June and has done marvelous work in leading our choir, orchestra and Classic service. Working with Crystal Byrd and Erin Raiber, he has provided important leadership for our children's choir ministry. We will always be thankful for Don's vision and leadership in making the 125th Anniversary Heritage Concert a

memorable worship and community event.

Chris Canary has led our LifeSong worship team and ministry over the past eight months. We have been blessed by his musical talents and leadership skills. Chris has always been gracious to bring his guitar and lead in worship whenever a group would ask. In addition, Chris teaches and offers his leadership to our young adult Sanctuary class each Sunday morning.

Laura Robertson will complete her interim as University Minister at the end of June. Laura has done nice work in leading and coordinating our university students over these last eight months and is preparing to enroll at Truett Seminary in the fall.

I hope that you will take time to individually thank these three ministers and let them know specifically how their ministry has impacted you.

On Sunday, May 31, we will gather in Hallock Hall for lunch and church conference immediately following worship. Important reports from our Budget/Finance and Personnel Committees will be provided. In addition to business, we will be blessed with the joy of fellowship and community as we share lunch together. Please make plans to attend.

On Father's Day, June 21, we will take an offering to support the relief and ministry efforts of CBF and SBC missionaries in Nepal. How will you financially support this work?

We begin our summer worship focus on May 31 with the sermon series: *Upside Down: The Wisdom of James*. Each week we will explore the upside down wisdom that he presents. After all, James invites us to "consider it joy when you encounter various trials." I look forward to the journey.

Floods of new awareness of God's love and faithfulness

May 2015 has proven to be a record breaking month in Central Oklahoma and around FBC.

We began the month with a significant positive vote to call Rev. Chad Smith as our first full time Minister of Worship Arts/Music in about 15 years, and I am excited to see what God has in store for us as a church.

Chad, Tara and their twin daughters, Addison and Ainsley, will move to Norman as Chad begins his ministry among us on Monday, June 8. Please pray that the move will go well for them as they transition to life and ministry in Norman.

Of course wind, rain, hail, tornadoes and more rain have been the story of the month. Many of our friends and neighbors have been affected in negative ways, and we need to be seeking ways to minister to them. For several years Oklahoma, Texas, and California, have seen severe drought conditions, and today many of those areas have seen sufficient rain to fill rivers, lakes and ponds, some to historic levels. While it has been a nuisance, and sometimes even a threatening event, there are many benefits.

In my short six decades of life, I have experienced a number

of seasons of drought. I am not a meteorologist with proof, but it seems they are always broken with severe rains and flooding. What about a spiritual reflection on the droughts that we go through

Individually and corporately as a church we need to emerge from a drought and let God be God and see the many ways he is working among us. I look forward to this journey.

Ignite Challenge: What a positive journey it has been to pray, plan, commit to fund, build and complete our phase one capital project in an east wing renovation. Nearly four years ago as a church we adopted a strategic facilities plan which will take us a few years and a

number of projects to complete. But we were Ignited to begin phase one. Through your faithful commitments to the project we were able to begin this first phase with sufficient commitments to pay the project off within three years.

We began the giving emphasis in October 2012 and since that time you have generously given to those commitments in the amount of \$2.7 million in the last 30 months (end of April). Currently, we have \$525,000 remaining to pay for the completed project. Some of this is due to a few of you giving above your commitment amount. Some have given who were unable to make a commitment up front and for all of this, God is being praised for your generosity. There remains about \$800,000 in commitments which means that if all of them are honored. we would pay off phase one and have seed money to begin discussions about phase two.

Please join with me in praying for God to move among us and complete this emphasis in October. I have faith. I believe. I commit to pray. I commit to continue giving. Will you join me? I look forward to celebrating with you.

Practicing the Discipline of Sabbath even in a busy world

Over the past two months I have mentioned in this space two spiritual practices that can help each of us more fully know God: silence and sacred reading (or *lectio divina*). I have received emails and phone calls from some who have begun to practice one or both of them. Thanks to all of you.

This month I mention another discipline that I think can be difficult for many of us — Sabbath.

Sabbath comes from the Hebrew word *shabbat*, which means "to cease." Israel's neighboring countries did not recognize a day away from work. After the Israelites left Egyptian slavery, God reminded them of the importance of keeping the Sabbath.

When manna fell from heaven for the Israelites to eat, they were told to gather one day's worth each morning. On the sixth day of each week, they could gather two days worth because none would be there the next day. Everyone was to spend the seventh day inside their home, resting. This picture of Sabbath required each family to trust that God would continue to provide each day what was needed. Sabbath does that

for each of us, as well.

Soon, God delivered the Ten Commandments, with the commandment to keep the Sabbath being the longest: Remember the sabbath day, and

keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work. But the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work — you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock or the alien resident in your towns. For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the Lord blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it.

In the New Testament, Jesus did not say, "Forget about the Sabbath; it's an old, dead tradition." With the coming of Christ, the Sabbath takes on new meaning. This, then, is how we can observe Sabbath that is true to Scripture: Obedience to God's command that we observe the Sabbath day and keep it holy – that



we maintain the Sabbath as a day of joyful worship and communion, a day of rest, and a day of reliance upon God

"To act as if the world cannot get along without our work for one day in seven is a startling display of pride that denies the sufficiency of our generous maker." — Dorothy Bass.

So, how can we do this? Keeping in mind that truly observing the Sabbath will be a huge disruption on our crazy-busy lives. THAT'S THE POINT. In our culture, it is very easy for a day off to become the day we get things done that we could not get done during the rest of the week. The disruption happens when we decide that we are going to take the time to fully rest. And to celebrate what Jesus has done for us.

When can your Sabbath be? Who will you be during that time?
