We must know Jesus Christ before we can imitate Him. **Charles Sheldon** (In His Steps)

In describing Christian discipleship as imitation, it seems that Sheldon invites us to ask the question: What does it mean to "know Jesus Christ?"

At a recent *First Steps* gathering we talked about the ways we grow in our knowledge of Jesus. Bible reading and study were first to be mentioned, followed by prayer (talking and listening). We know Jesus as we learn His story, understand His mission, witness how He lived (and died) and see His impact upon those who followed Him. The depth of our knowledge of Christ grows as we obey, serve and even suffer on His behalf. Practicing our faith nurtures imitation. How are you growing in the knowledge of Jesus? How are you imitating Him?

We also talked about the necessity of community in knowing Jesus. We experience Jesus through our encounters and relationships within the Body of Christ – the Church. We learn as we pray with, worship with, talk with and hold one another accountable. December 2015 is a year to celebrate as a record high giving month (in the last eight years). I would imagine that record would go back much further. We had a great need to have that kind of year, as we had unpaid missions and expenses that needed to be made up.

Now our challenge is to finish our fiscal year (end of March) well. Historically, giving to FBC falls, sometimes dramatically, in the first quarter where we lose what was gained in December. Join with me in committing to regular, continuing generosity as we seek to fulfill our call of ministry at FBC.

Winter weather effect on worship: When severe weather comes in on

Saturday night or early Sunday morning, it always presents a challenge to make the appropriate call to be wise in our decisions to have or cancel worship.

The church policy is for the Pastor, Minister of

Administration, and Deacon chair to be involved in making the decision. In recent years we have also consulted church members at the National Weather Service to help make sense of forecast information. Generally, we are inclined to follow our regular schedule unless an event is occurring or is immanent. However, travel safety of members and staff must be considered.


With the current worship schedule including an 8:30 a.m. service, our previous policy of making a Sunday morning decision does not provide adequate time to notify members,

especially our worship leadership of choir and orchestra.

Until further notice we will follow this new schedule for decision making and notification: If there is a high chance for sufficient weather to effect early worship, a decision will be made and notification given by 8:00 p.m. on Saturday. Generally this decision will only effect the 8:30 a.m. service, due to the fact that we know that forecasts are not 100 percent accurate. A final decision on LifeGroups and late service will be made and notification given by 7:30 a.m. on Sunday.

Sources of notification: All local television stations; the FBC website; Facebook: Twitter: and the church telephone, 321-1753, message will be updated when the decision is made to close.

If the decision is made to continue with services, there will be no notification. However, as in all circumstances we ask and assume that our members will use their own good judgment about being out in whatever weather comes in.

The season of Lent is upon us

Ash Wednesday, February 10, will begin our journey through this year's season of Lent. This season lasts for 40 days (excluding Sundays) leading up to Easter, where we will enjoy Resurrection Sunday.

As writer Rachel Held Evans reminds me each year, Lent is a time for reflection, penitence, and preparation. Some people like to use these 40 days to give up something... the idea being that instead of doing that which has been given up, we will focus our attention on reflecting and preparing.

Maybe you will choose to give up watching TV, instead spending that time serving someone. Maybe you can give up what some have called the "consumption of people," where we flip through our Facebook feeds or Twitter timelines just to consume those people, rather than really get to know them.

Some, instead, prefer to add something to their lives. For example,

some might read certain books, or pray through the Psalms. Below are some ideas that will benefit you during this year's Lent, should you choose to make a Lent commitment.

- Practice the prayer of examen each day. For more information on this, visit the link below to read an article with an explanation, as well as a plan for the practice. http://thewell.intervarsity.org/spiritual-formation/examen.
- Pray the offices for 40 days. The Daily Office consists of four times of prayer each day: morning prayers, midday prayers, evening prayers, and nighttime prayers. If you are not accustomed to praying in this way, I think a good starting point is Phyllis Tickle's *The Divine Hours, Pocket Edition*.

- Read a book that challenges you. Richard Rohr's Falling Upward: Spirituality for the Two Halves of Life comes with high recommendations.
- Give up something creatively. I recently read of someone giving up sleeping in for Lent. For some of us that would be more difficult than others. Could you give up sugar? Or caffeine? What about gossiping? Perfectionism? Legalism? Cynicism?

However you choose to spend your season of Lent, let this be between you and God. This is not something by which we judge those around us: "He's not doing nearly as much as I am during Lent," or "I wish I could be like her. Look at what she's doing." Lent is a season of reflection, penitence and preparation. Preparation for what? Resurrection. Let us continue to be made new.

I hope to see you at our Ash Wednesday service on Wednesday, February 10, 6-7:30 p.m. (as you are able, and it should take 20-30 minutes) in the Sanctuary.

If you would like to be a part of this ministry opportunity, come to the FLC on Saturday. I would love to hang out with you.




Rediscovering the art of dramatic worship







Seniors get a diploma and their roles shift. Expectations are different. They're not high schoolers any more, and for some, they may start to question where






 or even if – they still have a place in the church at all. For this reason, the faith of many students doesn't survive the transition out of youth and into college.
