And even in these early weeks, Chad's worship gifts and leadership have positively impacted both services. Let us continue to pray for Rev. Chad Smith as he works with our worship teams, choirs, musicians, vocalists and tech team. Is God stirring your heart to be more involved in worship?

The recent worship transition creates the opportunity for us to improve safety by limiting the use of our east and west doors as exits. By not entering through these doors we provide better security for our children and youth areas. In addition, with everyone entering the church through our Comanche Street entrances, we are better able to see and greet everyone who enters our church on Sunday morning.

The new Sunday schedule means that we have people arriving at three different times on Sunday mornings. Those arriving for Sunday School

If you are able, I invite you to join me in parking toward Eufaula Street in our main parking lot or in the FLC parking lot on Sunday mornings. I have mentioned two things recently that I want to follow up on. First, in August we will have initial conversations with leadership teams about our Main Street properties and how we can best use them to minister and be the presence of Christ in the downtown area. There are many wonderful possibilities. so let's be creative and sensitive to the movement of the Spirit of God. Second, I am planning an initial conversation to listen to you about the questions and concerns you have about the cultural issues of our day. I will keep you posted on both of these.

It's hard to believe that summer is almost over. I look forward to hearing the stories of ministry, learning and fun that you and our mission teams had over these months.

This is a wonderful time of the year to reconnect with First Baptist or to invite a new friend or family member to join us in worship and ministry. I look forward to sharing life together as this new season approaches.



#### It's time to open our eyes and see 'God Sightings' that surround us

# On a mission

First Baptist members reflect on their recent trip to Peru

Three First Baptist Church members, Trenton McMillen, Michelle Durham and Kim Marks, recently reflected on their time in Peru which was spent working closely with Operación San Andrés, a Christian organization committed to combating the effects of poverty in the community of Collíque.

A group of about 25 FBC members traveled to Peru in July.

While in Peru, Trenton McMillen said that he expected to see a lot of new things and experience a completely different culture. This was his first time out of the country.

"I also expected to see a fairly poverty-struck area in Collique. Those expectations were indeed met," Trenton said adding that his favorite and most meaningful part of the mission trip was meeting one of the workers at OSA named Noe.

"He was an amazing light on the OSA house and is also the worship leader at the new church in Collique. We connected immediately through music, and it's something I will not soon forget," Trenton said.

Michelle Durham said she did not have any expectations when she went to Peru, which was her first mission trip.

"I couldn't choose one moment that is my favorite, but rather every moment at OSA. Spending time with those kids and the staff at OSA was the best part. I loved getting to know them and loving on them. They were always so happy to see us and so joyful," Michelle said.

During the mission trip, FBC members played music, did crafts, played games and offered Bible studies. Some members visited a few of the homes in Collique and met members of the community.

"It was so interesting to see where and how they live. Everyone was sweet and proud of their homes," Michelle said. "We were bid goodbye with a kiss on the cheek and smiles."

The lasting memory of the trip for Michelle, she said, was seeing how excited the kids in Peru were to see the FBC group.



"Seeing them smile and laugh was the best part and just being able to love on these kids is something that cannot be replaced. I will never forget those kiddos," Michelle said.

Chair of FBC's Missions Team, Kim Marks, had never been to South America before, but she said that she was hoping to connect with the Peruvians who run OSA as well as those who benefit

from its ministry.

"As someone who has vague memories of once being a youth, and who also has raised only cats, but no children, I was initially hesitant about making a long trip with 25-plus people not of my generation," Kim said.

Kim goes on to mention that one expectation she had before the trip was to find a mission that assisted the poor and needy.

"What I found, however, was so much more. Operación San Andrés empowers the local people, not by giving handouts, but by training and equipping them to break the chains of poverty while providing for their spiritual needs. I truly respect the thought and prayer that has been put into this ministry," Kim said. "As for my expectation of connecting with FBC youth, I will say this, the youth of FBC Norman is the future of our church, and we are in good hands. These young men and women work and play well together. They are also bright, talented, energetic and fun. I am so glad I took the opportunity to connect with them. They are totally worth it."

Her favorite part of the trip actually happened on the last day the group was in Peru, Kim said.

"I was part of two small groups who traveled up into the foothills of the Andes Mountains to assist our two FBC-sponsored workers, Morgan Smith and Krystal Harrington, regarding a water filter project sponsored by Operación San Andrés. I walked the streets of Collíque, closely observing the impoverished homes and destitute conditions I had previously only seen from afar, through the safety of my camera lens. These were the actual homes of the children we met earlier in the week. Reconciling those children with these conditions absolutely moved me to tears. It also sealed in my heart how fervently our prayers are needed for the Lord's work in Peru," Kim said.

It's always fun when you get to go on mission trips with students.

The way that they experience new places is fun to watch, learning a new normal for a set period of time, finding their place in it, and figuring out how to share God's love in it.

For our students, it was the same kind of thing this year.

When we were leaving, we were all uncertain what exactly we would end

all uncertain what exactly we would end up doing — mission trips have a way of requiring you to be flexible — but we were certain that our task was to share God's love.

As we were on our first flights, we figured out that there were a handful of students who had never been on a plane before, and most had never been out of the country. All of the experiences were new.

And yet, all of the experiences were old. After all, sharing God's love is something that our students have learned to do at our church. They do it in Vacation Bible School. They do it by sharing their time in local community missions. They do it by working with the Baptist Children's Home. So when we stepped off the plane in Peru, we were anxious about how things were going to work out, but were confident that we had been properly prepared by God for this work.

Sure enough, all of our anxiety melted away when our students saw the children. It's amazing how quickly they were playing with them, learning how to communicate with them, leading them in crafts and Bible stories and singing.

This trip wasn't "Peru or bust" for us. While we weren't sure exactly what to expect, we knew that God had called us to share love with them, taking the "or bust" part out of that equation and calling us to enjoy living and serving in Peru for a week. Instead of "Peru or bust," it was Peru or Peru, which became the hashtag that we used for our trip on Facebook and Twitter, if you want to read more about it. Also, our students wrote some blogs that will remain on the church website about their experiences, which I would encourage you to read.

#### Worship arts ministry offers many ways to serve

As summer begins to wind down, it is a great time to begin praying about and considering how you will use the spiritual gifts and talents God has given you to serve the Bride of Christ in the new school year. I'd like to use this article to let you know the different ways you can use your gifts and talents in the music and worship arts ministry here at First Baptist Norman.

Growing in Praise is our music and worship arts opportunity for children ages 4 through fifth grade. Directed by Erin Raiber and Gigi Nieto, this is a wonderful ministry that teaches children age appropriate music fundamentals and introduces them to the basic theology of worship and what it means to be a worshiper and worship leader. Growing in Praise has two groups: age 3 through kindergarten and first through fifth grades. Growing in Praise meets on Wednesday evenings from 5:45-6:30 in the children's (west) wing in rooms 216 and 217 beginning August 26. Growing in Praise will sing monthly in both worship services, participate in the annual Christmas presentation and present an annual musical.

SMAK (Summer Music Activities for Kids) is a new children's music and worship arts opportunity coming in summer 2016. This is a week-long, full-day camp for children who have completed kindergarten through fifth grade. The kids will learn an entire musical production and present it the Sunday evening following SMAK.

Coming in mid-fall 2015 is our new music and worship opportunity for students. The student choir will meet on Sunday afternoons and will sing in worship from time to time, participate in the annual Christmas presentation and will present an annual concert. Plans are underway for a week-long student choir mission early next summer.

Our sanctuary choir meets each Wednesday evening from 6:30-8:00 in the music suite for rehearsal. No audition is required. The choir helps lead the early service each week, participates in the annual Christmas, Easter and Independence Day presentations and also

will participate in the semi-annual choir and orchestra mission trip. The choir will begin Christmas preparations soon. If you are unable to commit to the choir full time but would like to sing in the Christmas presentation, you

are welcome to come to the first half of Wednesday night rehearsals beginning September 2.

The FBC Norman sanctuary orchestra, under the direction of Dr. Michael Raiber, rehearses each Sunday morning from 7:15-8:15 in the sanctuary. There is no audition required but the ability to read music and familiarity with your instrument are necessary. The orchestra is open to anyone high school age and older. The orchestra helps lead the early service each week, participates in the annual Christmas, Easter and Independence Day presentations and presents an annual concert. The orchestra also will participate in the biennial choir and orchestra mission trip.

We also have a worship team for our late service that consists of a band and vocal team. There is an immediate need for instrumentalists and vocalists at this time. An audition is required and the ability to read music is encouraged. Rehearsals are Thursday evenings from 6:30-8:00 in the sanctuary. Call or email me today to set up an audition.

If you don't consider yourself a singer or instrumentalist our technical ministry is just the place for you. The tech team consists of our audio, video, and lighting teams and is the glue that holds everything together on Sunday mornings and for special events.

Other ways to get involved include drama ministry, set/scenic design and construction, Scripture reading, leading prayers in our worship services, and costuming. As our church continues to grow there are sure to be more opportunities available.


