I was in St. Louis on a recent Saturday in preparation for the SBC Pastors Conference beginning Sunday afternoon. I decided to venture out Sunday morning to the nearest FBC. I googled their website and found what I needed to know.

As I approached the church that morning, I turned into the first parking lot I came to, not sure where to go. There were several spots available, but I quickly surmised that I was in the back of the church and not in the main parking area. I parked and not knowing where to go, followed a couple into a hallway with several classrooms, guessing the stairs would take me to the sanctuary. At the top of the stairs, I approached an usher who gave me a bulletin and said, "Good morning."


I made my way into the fan-shaped sanctuary, sitting in one of the center sections about a third of the way down in the middle of a pew. I was about 10-15 minutes early and watched as the congregation of 500-600 entered for worship. I noticed folks of all ages.

The fellowship was rich with laughter and conversation. People greeted each other with warmth. The multi-generational family in front of me filled the entire pew. They were glad to be together in worship.

I enjoyed a meaningful morning of worship, but I'm not sure that I would go back. With the exception of the usher, who I approached, not one person spoke to me the entire morning. I was surrounded by people talking, laughing, embracing, and worshiping, yet not one word. I wondered if anyone cared that I was there. The warmth of their fellowship was visible, but came off as exclusive instead of inclusive.

With the final "Amen," I made my way out of the sanctuary, down the stairs, into the parking lot, invisible to the folks around me.

FBC Norman? Do they find our website informative and inviting? Is parking convenient? (I appreciate our staff and others who intentionally park at the back of the parking lot so that our closer parking is available to seniors, guests and families with small children.)

Do people know where to go when they arrive? (I am grateful for greeters and ushers who welcome and assist everyone who enters the church and sanctuary.)

But, still, these are the expected systems that all churches should have. The difference is found in the sanctuary, hallways, classrooms and parking lots when hospitality and friendliness are not programmed, but a natural expression of community. Visitors discern fairly quickly if they are genuinely welcome and if there is a place for them.

How do visitors experience FBC? I hear from many of our guests how friendly we are and how they were welcomed with open arms. I also hear stories of folks that have similar experiences to the one I had in St. Louis. One week I received a note from a visitor who was told by two of our members that he was sitting in their

The truth is, you determine how a visitor experiences FBC. Take a few moments before worship to greet those around you. Introduce our guests to a staff member or friend. Together we can make sure that everyone who comes to FBC is welcome and feels part of this family, even if for a week.

All of that led to four years ago this August when we had our Ignite kickoff events, followed by a season of commitment and generous giving.

You pledged funds to complete the east wing renovations, including the new elevator tower, youth hall updates, general safety upgrades, youth, adult, choir suite and office upgrades. Since we began Ignite, \$3,125,190 has been given (end of May) and that is above a stable giving record to our regular ministry plan (budget). Praise God for your faithfulness.

Today we continue to give toward the construction loan balance of \$146,295. The generosity and faithfulness of the many who made this possible is more than exciting. I hope in the coming weeks that we can gain a vision to join God in completing the task that He began among us, and allow us to acknowledge His faithfulness exhibited through His people and see that loan amount paid in full. I hope that you will be one of the many who can say, I responded and joined with this family of faith in response to what God is about here in this place.

As you go about your summer activities I pray that you find time and space to worship God. There are many more ministry opportunities here for you to find a place to serve, great worship to participate in, and a need to grow together.

The last eight years have been a blessing to journey alongside you. I look forward to all that God still has in store for us together.

For some of us, removing the phone from our hand remains a near-impossible task. Think about it... in our very hand, we are able to get information quickly... almost too quickly. We can check OU scores, we can see movie

times and then purchase the tickets to the movie to which we want to go, we can communicate with our families, and we can turn on and off our lights. These phones are handy.

If you've spent any time around me, you know I may have the hardest time of all setting down my tech. While I feel like most of what I'm doing when I use my tech is helpful, not just for me, but for others, I realize that I have to learn to set these things to the side on occasion.

What we're learning through research is that the more time we spend using our tech, the more capable we become in analyzing large amounts of data quickly. We are learning that our brains change as we continue to use our tech like this. We are training our brains to see a headline or a title and know immediately if it's helpful or not. Because of this we are having difficulty spending any amount of time in deep thought or in reading anything longer than a few minutes. Herein lies the problem...

In order to participate in the practice of Sabbath, we must be able to spend more than a few minutes in rest... the kind of rest that allows for meditation or

deep reading or focusing on one particular person in our family for an extended period of time. We (and I'm talking to me first) need to learn how to set down our tech... to intentionally rest our eyes, our brain from

scattered thinking. By the way, what we're also learning through research is that this is good for our health. We sleep better when we decide to set aside all tech for the few hours

prior to our head hitting the pillow.

It seems like it might just be worth it to set our tech down as a way to practice Sabbath. Rather than setting them down for an entire day, what might happen if we set them down for the two hours prior to our bedtime each night for a week? I know it may sound like an impossible task, but might it be worth it enough to at least give it a try?

My goal this year is to have at least 24 mentors and to have at least two mentors per classroom. This

will not only provide extra support for children who need it most, but also will provide each teacher with two

To be a mentor, you must commit to one hour a week for the school year, be able to read, have a passion to help children in need, and have transportation to the school. Our mentors must also be members or regular attenders of FBC Norman and pass a criminal background check.
